





DISCUSSION:

Welfare arrangements of CME attuned to cyclical needs of capitalist economy

Welfare regulation on care and women's work:

- mainly to respond to labour force demands of production to sustain capital accumulation
- Responded to changes in production needs
 - Periods of economic expansion: regulation and investment
 - Periods of restructuring: reorientation and reduction of care cost

Reduction of collective care:

- → refamilisation and privatization of care: mostly felt by women (low-skilled, migrant, single parents)
- → subordination of care work to needs of production: un(der)paid

Gender inequalities reshaped:

- to a formal gender-equal 'one-and-a-half earner' model
- Women still **subordinate** position in LM and society
